Biblical values are being destroyed in America at an astonishing rate. A major contributing factor to the current "flood of immorality" is the growing idea that the Ten Commandments were nailed to the cross and are no longer binding. This "lie" is largely due to a failure to understand the New Testament distinction between "the law of sacrifices" and the Ten Commandments.

The Law of Sacrifices has been Abolished

- Hebrews 10:1,8 "The law" that Moses wrote was "a shadow of good things to come." It involved "sacrifices ... and burnt offerings ... which are offered by the law."
- Ephesians 2:15 Jesus Christ "abolished ... the law of commandments contained in ordinances."
- Colossians 2:14-17 "Blotting out the handwriting of ordinances that was against us ... nailing it to his cross ... let no man therefore judge you in meat or in drink, or in respect of an holy day, or of the new moon, or of the sabbath days: which are a shadow of things to come."

The above verses are not talking about the Ten Commandments. Leviticus 23 describes "a meat offering ... and drink offering" (23:37) which were to be offered on various yearly "sabbaths" (23:24,32,39), according to the law of Moses. "This law" was written by the hand of Moses in a "book" and was "against" Israel (Duet. 31:24-26). It was "a shadow" pointing forward to the Great Sacrifice of Jesus Christ. Hebrews 10:1,8. This law has been "abolished."

The Law of Sacrifices has been Abolished

The Ten Commandments point out sin. Romans 3:20;7:7. The Sacrifices pointed forward to the Great Sacrifice for sin. The law of Moses was "nailed to the cross." Colossians 2:14. The Ten Commandments are in "the ark" in heaven. Revelation 11:19; 12:17; 14:12; 15:5; 22:14 (KJV)

What is the "New Commandment"?

Jesus said, "A new commandment I give unto you, That ye love one another; as I have loved you." John 13:34. The command "to love" was not new. Moses said, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." Lev. 19:18. What is new is the words, "as I have loved you." How has Jesus loved us? By dying on the cross for our sins of breaking the law! 1 Cor. 15:3; 1 John 3:4. The "new" should not lead to breaking "the Ten," for this Jesus never did. Paul wrote, "love is the fulfilling of the law." Romans 13:10. Through grace, love fulfills the law. 1 John 5:3.

What about the "Two Commandments"?

"Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first ... the second is like unto it, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." Mat. 22:37-40. Jesus was quoting the Old Testament. Deut. 6:5; Lev. 19:18. The "Two" are a summary of "the Ten." To "love God" is to keep the first four. To "love man" is to keep the last six. Paul said the second table of the law is "briefly comprehended in this saying, namely, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." Rom. 13:9. If we keep "the Two," we will keep "the Ten."

What the New Covenant?

"This is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins." Matthew 26:28. "This is the covenant that I will make with them ... I will put my laws into their hearts, and in their minds will I write them; And their sins and iniquities will I remember no more." Hebrews 10:16,17. Thus the New Covenant is Forgiveness of our Sins through the Blood of Jesus Christ and the Ten Commandments written in the Heart by the power of God.

"Not under the law, but under grace?" Romans 6:14.

To be "under the law" means to be "guilty before God" for breaking the law. Romans 3:19,20. It means the law is "on top" of us. When we repent and have faith in Jesus, we are forgiven by his grace and are no longer "guilty before God." Are we then free "to break the law?" Paul says, "What then? Shall we sin, because we are not under the law, but under grace? God forbid." Rom. 6:15.

Jesus "Fulfilled the Law." What does this mean?

Jesus said, "Think not that I am come to destroy the law or the prophets: I am not come to destroy, but to fulfil." Mat. 5:17. "Fulfil" does not mean "destroy." Jesus said don't even think that thought! It means rather to "fill full." Jesus said, "till heaven and earth pass, one jot or one tittle shall in no wise pass from the law." Therefore Christ said we should not "break one of these least commandments," but rather we should "do" and "teach" them. Mat. 5:18,19.

"Blessed are they that do his commandments,

that they may have right to the tree of life, and may enter in through the gates into the city. For without are ... murderers, and idolaters, and whosoever loveth and maketh a lie."

Revelation 22:14,15 (KJV)

What is the "New Commandment"?

Jesus said, "A new commandment I give unto you, That ye love one another; as I have loved you." John 13:34. The command "to love" was not new. Moses said, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." Lev. 19:18. What is new is the words, "as I have loved you." How has Jesus loved us? By dying on the cross for our sins of breaking the law! 1 Cor. 15:3; 1 John 3:4. The "new" should not lead to breaking "the Ten," for this Jesus never did. Paul wrote, "love is the fulfilling of the law." Romans 13:10. Through grace, love fulfills the law. 1 John 5:3.

What about the "Two Commandments"?

"Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first ... the second is like unto it, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." Mat. 22:37-40. Jesus was quoting the Old Testament. Deut. 6:5; Lev. 19:18. The "Two" are a summary of "the Ten." To "love God" is to keep the first four. To "love man" is to keep the last six. Paul said the second table of the law is "briefly comprehended in this saying, namely, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." Rom. 13:9. If we keep "the Two," we will keep "the Ten."

What the New Covenant?

"This is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins." Matthew 26:28. "This is the covenant that I will make with them ... I will put my laws into their hearts, and in their minds will I write them; And their sins and iniquities will I remember no more." Hebrews 10:16,17. Thus the New Covenant is Forgiveness of our Sins through the Blood of Jesus Christ and the Ten Commandments written in the Heart by the power of God.

"Not under the law, but under grace?" Romans 6:14.

To be "under the law" means to be "guilty before God" for breaking the law. Romans 3:19,20. It means the law is "on top" of us. When we repent and have faith in Jesus, we are forgiven by his grace and are no longer "guilty before God." Are we then free "to break the law?" Paul says, "What then? Shall we sin, because we are not under the law, but under grace? God forbid." Rom. 6:15.

Jesus "Fulfilled the Law." What does this mean?

Jesus said, "Think not that I am come to destroy the law or the prophets: I am not come to destroy, but to fulfil." Mat. 5:17. "Fulfil" does not mean "destroy." Jesus said don't even think that thought! It means rather to "fill full." Jesus said, "till heaven and earth pass, one jot or one tittle shall in no wise pass from the law." Therefore Christ said we should not "break one of these least commandments," but rather we should "do" and "teach" them. Mat. 5:18,19.
